


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# A MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHBISHOP



# Dear Parishioners and Clergy of the Archdiocese,

Welcome to the latest addition to the communications platform of the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan - the presentation of a newly formatted *Annual Report*.

The idea of an "annual report" came to me from a similar report that I saw from the Archdiocese of Vancouver some time ago. I've been told that they recently decided to cease their publication of a report, but that didn't discourage me from taking up the idea with my consultors and Kyle Greenham, our communications officer.



Communication is a challenge in every aspect of life. We can only respond to what we know, and we only know what we have heard – or read. As St. Paul says in Romans 10:14-15, speaking about the divine commission to proclaim: "But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? 

Through our work in small towns, growing cities, rural areas, Indigenous reserves and settlements, we serve a diversity of peoples, communities and ways of life.





A **parish** is a Catholic community with at least 200 persons, that has a resident priest the parish community can support financially, and has a functioning parish finance and/or pastoral council.

A **quasi-parish** is a Catholic community that is lacking in one or more of these characteristics, but is still self-supporting.

A **mission** is a Catholic community that cannot support itself financially and is largely dependent on the archdiocese to meet its needs. *You can learn more about our missions on page 18.* 





# **RELIGIOUS LIFE**



### Our priests...

The priesthood is foundational to the life of the Church. St. John Vianney, the patron saint of parish priests, said "The priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus. When you see a priest, think of our Lord." As the priest is in persona Christi (Latin for in the person of Christ) he is to stand as an example of the same love, dedication, charity and sacrifice exemplified in our Lord.







In our archdiocese, we rely on priests who are **diocesan** and **religious.** 

**Religious priests** are priests who belong to a religious order or congregation. They may work within our archdiocese, but they ultimately belong to, and are under the authority of, the religious congregation for which they were ordained.

A **diocesan priest** is a priest ordained not for a religious order but for a diocese. He is thus called specifically to serve the people within the geographical region of his diocese. A diocesan priest can be also sent on loan to another diocese or to minister to an institution where his talents and expertise may be required.

**Six** of our diocesan priests were not originally ordained in our archdiocese, or initially belonged to a religious order, before being permanently transferred and **incardinated** into our archdiocese.

# CELEBRATION OF THE SACRAMENTS



The sacraments express the life and grace of the Church. The word "sacrament" refers to a set of religious rituals, instituted by Jesus Christ and the First Apostles, that involve the imparting of divine grace and sanctification upon believers.

In the Catholic Church, there are seven sacraments: Baptism, Reconciliation, Confirmation, the Eucharist, Marriage, Holy Orders and the Anointing of the Sick. Each of these sacraments plays a vital role in the ministry of the Church and the fostering of faith amongst its members.

# CATHOLIC EDUCATION





Alberta remains one of only three Canadian provinces that has publicly-funded **Catholic schools**. The Catholic schools within the archdiocese maintain a close relationship with their local parish priests, who often visit the schools for Masses, religion classes and in other faithbased and educational efforts.

There are **four school divisions within the Archdiocese** that are part of this criteria. All statistics here are from the **Sept. 2020-June 2021 school year**.



# COMMUNICATIONS





Beginning in **April of 2021**, our communications office became a full-time operation. Expanding this office has allowed us to better share information among our people and to better publicize the work and stories in the archdiocese. Several communications efforts were introduced in 2021, including a monthly magazine called **Northern Light**, the development of routine video and photo content, the expansion of the archdiocese's use of social media, and in 2021 we initiated work towards a **new archdiocesan website**.

Top engagement

Facebook remains our most prominent social media platform, receiving engagements from **more than 78,000 people** in 2021. Here were our **top three most popular posts on Facebook** in 2021:

1) Our Indian Residential School Photo Project got the most reach of all of our social media content, reaching 23,429 people on Facebook. *(shared Sept. 20, 2021)* 

2) Archbishop Pettipas' letter on the fire that destroyed Little Flower Mission Church in Fox Lake reached 12, 123 people (shared August 10, 2021)

3) Our **interview with Angie Crerar**, a Grande Prairie resident and former residential school student who was part of the delegation that met with Pope Francis in Rome was our third most engaged post in 2021, reaching **7**, **112 people**. *(shared Nov. 9, 2021)* 



### COUNCILS, COMMITTEES AND MINISTRY OFFICES





Covering such a large region, and with so many roles to fill and tasks to complete, our archdiocese is made up of multiple **councils, committees** and **ministry offices** that play a vital role in ensuring that all duties of the archdiocese are discussed and executed well. As of 2021, the archdiocese had five committees, three councils and three ministry offices.





The **Faith Formation Committee** supports catechesis and the fostering of faith throughout the Archdiocese, helping our pastors, churches and faithful come to an ever deeper understanding and relationship with Christ and His Church.

The **Liturgy Committee** discusses and develops strategies around protocols and concerns related to the celebration of the Mass and liturgical practices in the archdiocese.





The **Vocations Committee** focuses on the encouragement of and fostering of vocations. The committee develops strategies and projects to help people of the archdiocese discern where God is calling them in their lives – whether that be to the priesthood, consecrated life, married life or elsewhere.



The **Communications Committee** is tasked with initiating and developing strategies for effective information sharing and event promotion throughout the archdiocese. The committee makes recommendations to the Communications Office.



### COUNCILS, COMMITTEES AND MINISTRY OFFICES



The **Native Pastoral Council** was established to help churches within the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan better respond to the needs of the First Nations and Metis peoples served by many of our parishes.

The **Finance Council** is made up of persons with qualifications in finance, administration and business who review and make recommendations on various financial concerns and investments that affect the archdiocese at large and its many churches.

The **Archdiocesan Pastoral Council** is a consultative body, under the direction of the archbishop, with representatives from clergy, archdiocesan committees, churches and other Catholic organizations that minister in the archdiocese, to discuss and collaborate on a variety of pastoral concerns and for the development of a pastoral plan.















The **Office of Evangelization and Catechesis**, based in the Catholic Conference Centre in Peace River, focuses on providing resources, programs, retreats and other efforts related to catechesis in the archdiocese.

The **Office of Youth Ministry** coordinates events, efforts and strategies related to reaching out to young people of the Archdiocese, to empower them with the support and community necessary to growing in faith. The **Youth Committee** acts as a advisory body to this office.

The **Office of Life & Family** provides resources and assistance to families and lay people within the archdiocese, helping them grow in their faith and their relationship to Christ and His Church. Since 2019, Deacon Gerald Logan has acted as head of this ministry office.



### MAJOR EVENTS IN 2021






Despite the many challenges and obstacles posed by pandemic restrictions at certain times during the year, 2021 still had many successful **pilgrimages**, **retreats** and **other events**. The elimination of many restrictions during the summer and fall allowed for the return of several annual events and a first-ever "**Pastoral Ministry Month**" series of retreats.

#### Year of St. Joseph Pilgrimage

Beginning on March 19th 2021, the solemnity of St. Joseph, the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan declared the archdiocesan "Year of St. Joseph", along side the Year of St. Joseph declared by Pope Francis. As part of the celebrations for this most holy saint, a pilgrimage was organized around the three churches in the archdiocese named after St. Joseph – in Grande Prairie, Spirit River and John D'or Prairie. The archdiocese designed a "pilgrim's passport" with an attached prayer to St. Joseph as part of this pilgrimage, which ran until the following Solemnity of St. Joseph in 2022.





#### **Eleske Pilgrimage**

The Eleske Pilgrimage was held on July 31st, 2021 at the grotto grounds for St. Bernadette Church in Eleske, a Beaver Nation Indigenous reserve. Various Indigenous practices were included in the pilgrimage, including drumming, smudging, and praying in the four directions, as well as a blessing of the waters, a candlelight procession and celebration of Mass.

#### **Vacation Bible School**

The Vacation Bible School, held at Moonshine Lake Provincial Park, is a faith-based initiative offering faith formation and community for young children and their families each summer. The Aug. 9-11 campout was hosted and organized by parents from the Spirit River and Rycroft Catholic communities. Families from these areas, as well as Silver Valley, Grande Prairie, Fairview, Dawson Creek and elsewhere also participated. More than 30 young people and their parents joined.





### MAJOR EVENTS IN 2021



#### **Assumption Pilgrimage**

The Assumption Pilgrimage in Girouxville was held for the Feast of the Assumption on August 15th. Because the feast fell on a Sunday in 2021, the pilgrimage was held over a full weekend, with services beginning on Friday evening and ending on Sunday afternoon. Daily Mass, processions, a healing service, and many other prayerful activities were included as part of the annual pilgrimage at the Notre Dame de Lourdes grotto and neighbouring church.





#### **Pastoral Ministry Month**

#### **Priests' Retreat**

The priests of the archdiocese came together for their annual retreat at Providence Renewal Centre in Edmonton, held from Aug 30-Sept. 3. This retreat, held annually and typically around the Labour Day weekend, offers a chance for our priests to come together for comradery, spiritual renewal and to discuss the various joys and concerns of their ministry.

The Office of Evangelization and Catechesis hosted the first-ever Pastoral Ministry Month in November of 2021, to ignite the spirit and commitments of parish pastoral council leaders, ministry leaders/volunteers and teachers in our Catholic schools. A series of deanery retreats and an online conference were a part of the events, all focused on the joys, charism and meaning of ministry. With all the retreats and diocese-wide conference together, more than 245 people attended.





#### Archbishop's Dinner

On Nov. 5, 2021 the archdiocese hosted its annual Archbishop's Dinner, and for the second time in a row it was hosted live from the Archbishop's home kitchen and livestreamed from our official Facebook page. As the meal was prepared, the audience engaged in an "How well do you know your archbishop" trivia game. Fr. Remi Hebert, parish priest for St. Joseph's Church in Grande Prairie, co-hosted the event. In the initial week of the livestream the replay itself received more than 900 views. \$6,575 were raised through the dinner's online auction and additional donations.

#### Camp St. Martin

In late 2021, preparatory work also began for bringing back Camp St. Martin for the summer of 2022.



### TACKLING CHALLENGES





In any diocese, there are many **issues**, **obstacles** and **difficulties** that arise each year. When taking care of so many church properties and rectories, as well as the many needs of priests, staff and parishioners, there are bound to be times when natural disasters, infrastructure issues and other unforeseen circumstances arise. Here are some of the ways we've had to band together when these sorts of challenges came our way.

### **Combatting COVID restrictions with appeal**

With the suspension of public Mass across Canada and much of the world due to restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic, many dioceses had to act fast and find new ways to ensure the survival and support of their church communities. Our archdiocese wanted to reach out to its people directly. Using a large mailing list, initially compiled for a future Archbishop's Appeal, the archdiocese instead decided to use this list for a different campaign, encouraging parishioners to continue supporting their local church through the pandemic. A letter was penned by Archbishop Pettipas, offering his thoughts and prayers for their well being and safety, and asking parishioners to support their church in whatever ways possible through the pandemic. It was mailed out to over 10,000 addresses, and the campaign helped bring much-needed support to our churches.





#### Rebuilding from flood damage in Fort Vermillion

In April of 2020, the Peace River flooded the town of Fort Vermillion, flooding both the basement of St. Henri's Church and the neighbouring rectory and cemetery. When the waters finally receded, more than \$400,000 in damage were done to the church and rectory. Along with a complete overhaul and renovation of these properties, including new flooring, tiling, insulation, drywall and paneling, all water lines and plumbing were also replaced. Much of the books, records, furniture and appliances were also ruined in the flood and had to be replaced. By the summer of 2021, all of the initial renovation work to the church basement and rectory were completed.

#### Chateh rectory repairs and renovation

Over the years, major problems had developed in the infrastructure of the Our Lady of the Assumption rectory in the Dene community of Chateh, largely due to a lack of insulation near the windows of the church. In 2021, some muchneeded repairs were completed to this rectory. New insulation was installed, shingles on its roof were replaced, new flooring and ceiling were added and all mold removed. New furniture was also given to the rectory.





### CHARITY AND STEWARDSHIP



'What you have done to the least of my brothers, you have done it also unto me.' (Matt. 25:40) Christ's words cut to the heart of the Gospel message. As stewards of the Gospel, the Church has a vital role to play in offering charitable support in all areas of life where the need is present. We list here just a **small sample** of some of the **charitable efforts** churches in our region were involved in over the 2021 calendar year.







#### **Reverse food drives**

#### **Shoes for reconciliation**

Partnering with St. Mary's Catholic Church in Barrie, Ontario, the Archdiocese helped distribute five large boxes of donated shoes for Indigenous communities in our region. The shoes, from children to adult sizes, went to the communities of Hythe, Horse Lake, John D'or Prairie, Fox Lake, Wabasca and Chateh (Assumption). The parish priest and Catholic school in these areas helped with distributing the shoes to those in need.

#### **Refugee resettlement**

In 2021, the refugee resettlement committee with St. Joseph Catholic Church in Grande Prairie partnered with the Archdiocese for a co-sponsorship of one family-linked resettlement to Grande Prairie. The family was a mother, father and four adult children from Somalia, who arrived in Grande Prairie in October of 2021. Other potential refugee resettlements are also being worked on by the archdiocese and the refugee resettlement committee.

St. Joseph Church in Grande Prairie hosted two "Reverse Food Drives" in 2021, accepting donations from parishioners and the community-at-large for the local Salvation Army Food Bank. Both priests and parishioners volunteered, loading and unloading many hundreds of groceries into a mobile trailer. St. Joseph Church collects donations for the food bank year round, on average collecting 300 pounds of food each week.

#### **Bread ministry**

Immaculate Conception Church in Sexsmith has taken part in a weekly "bread ministry" for many years now. Through it, they help deliver free bread to families, seniors and impoverished people in the community. Each week, approximately 150 loafs and other bread products are distributed by the parish, through a partnership with Cobb's Bread. It helps more than 60 people in the Sexsmith community each week.



These are just a few of the many charitable efforts our churches were involved with over 2021!



# MISSION CHURCHES





There are **30 missions** in the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan, many of them dedicated to serving Indigenous peoples in the **Cree**, **Dene** and **Beaver** communities and **Metis** settlements of our region. Vital to the sustainability and development of these church communities is the archdiocese's partnership with **Catholic Missions in Canada (CMIC)**, a Canadian Catholic fundraising organization dedicated to helping and supporting church communities in some of Canada's poorest and most isolated regions.

# COAT OF ARMS



### Understanding our Coat of Arms

The top half of our coat of arms is coloured blue in honour of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The fleur-de-lis (left) represents the early French settlers of our region, the eagle feather (right) represents the Indigenous peoples of our region, and the cross, sponge, spear and crown of thorns (center) is taken from the Oblates of Mary Immaculate's coat of arms, who were the first evangelizers in our archdiocese.



The **bottom half** of our coat of arms has the colours of a **traditional medicine wheel**. At its center is a **red cloak** in honour of our archdiocese's patron saint, **St. Martin of Tours**, who charitably offered his cloak to a beggar. The **white rose** is for **St. Therese of** *Lisieux*, patron saint of our missions and our ecclesiastical province.

The coat of arms of every diocese is marked at its top and bottom with a mitre and banner.



### Revenue & Expenditures 2021




**Assessment of Operation** refers to all revenues the archdiocese receives from parishes for its operating expenses. This was formally called the *catedraticum*.

### Catholic Missions in Canada

provided funding for our mission churches (\$360,370) and for seminary formation (\$48,000). This is funding the Archdiocese applies for each year.

The Archdiocese raised \$22,601 in our northern missions fund through the Ash Wednesday Collection. In 2021, these funds went to repairing the rectory at the Our Lady of the Assumption Church in Chateh. For 2022-2027, this collection will go towards the Indigenous Reconciliation Fund.

As a missionary diocese, the Archdiocese of Grouard McLennan receives **financial support** each year from the **Archdiocese of Toronto** to help fund specific projects in our northern missions. However, in 2021 there was no specific project developed for this funding.

The Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan doesn't exist in a bubble. We are engaged in the world around us. We face the same challenges and struggle with the same issues that others in our world do. What is happening elsewhere in other dioceses, in the Holy See, in Canadian society and globally often calls for a response from us as well. And so, our archdiocese is called to do its part in addressing the things that affect our Church, society and world.

The **COVID-19 pandemic** has affected the whole world, and often in drastic ways. The impact was felt severely by some, such as families who lost loved ones from the virus or whose livelihoods were shattered. In church terms, the social and moral impacts were huge, and gave rise to many divisions and ruptured relations within families and communities.

We saw the temporary closing of parish churches, and the more long-standing alienation of parishioners. Our sense of community and unity around our Catholic faith has been wounded; it is obvious that for some, the wound needs time to heal. In the meantime, I look to our pastors and their pastoral councils to gently but confidently draw people back to the pews, for their personal spiritual wellbeing and that of the whole community. This will take time, and will require many initiatives with great perseverance and faith.

Like the Catholic Church around the world, we have prepared for and have now shared in a common experience of "**synodality**" – listening to the promptings of the Holy Spirt, sharing with one another, and "walking together" on the pilgrim way. I have often remarked that synodality is not entirely new in the Church; we have many experiences of its action in our midst. The new element that Pope Francis wanted us to undertake, is to listen to those on the edges, the periphery of life and society. A very common experience of this synodality over the past year was that those on the edge were largely missing from the exercise. They bowed out on this exercise, as we see they've done already on the Church in general. I believe this calls us to take ever new and creative steps to reach out to them. As for our diocese, I will be calling on us to continue adopting the synodal model in the Archdiocesan Pastoral Council and in other diocesan committees.

Pope Francis responded graciously to the Call to Action #58 of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in his recent "penitential pilgrimage" to Canada. We heard him and others say that this gesture is "not the end, but the beginning." Indeed. One misguided thought that seems to arise in many places, is that the process of **reconciliation** is primarily for Indigenous people. Not so. Reconciliation calls on us all. Each one of us should be pondering the question: "What am I going to participate in over the next year, to promote reconciliation? What initiative / ceremony / workshop will I be present at, to express my longing for reconciliation?"

Our archdiocese has made a commitment to the **Indigenous Reconciliation Fund** (IRF).We will be announcing the projects that are funded by our contributions as time goes by. The IRF is a five-year project as regards the raising of funds, but we will have seven years in which to disburse the funds. As of this writing, I am assembling a Projects Acceptance Committee made up of Indigenous members from our region, that will approve projects according to the norms set up by the IRF directors.

Further to this, the Catholic Church throughout Canada is committed to "walking together" with our Indigenous brothers and sisters. While the proximity of Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities to one another varies throughout the country, there is a renewed spirit of unity being promoted by the bishops throughout Canada. In time, I believe that we in this archdiocese will have many occasions to express our common humanity and solidarity as people of peace and faith.

# Addressing upcoming efforts in the archdiocese....

There are a few "projects", if you will, that we in the archdiocese will be working on over the coming weeks, months and years. Some of these I have kept in my mind for many years; others are more recent developments. I speak of them gently with my consultors and priests from time to time, waiting for the opportune moments for them to take shape and begin to happen. I see myself as a patient man. Rome wasn't built in a day; nether was the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan.

Let me speak to some of these projects we are working towards – some only in their conceptual stages and some well under way.

### St. Bernard Church restoration

The original cathedral for our diocese is still intact, in the village of Grouard. St. Bernard Church was built under the watchful eyes of a newly-ordained Bishop Emile Grouard. He was an artist in his own right, and if you visit that church today you will see figures of saints and angels that he personally painted. A number of years ago we began a restoration of this beautiful and most historic church. We restored the outer shell of the church, consistent with a chosen era in its history; it looks better than ever! Our next task is to tackle the interior, to enhance the original beauty of the walls and ceiling. Beauty comes at a cost of skill and labour. I will be seeking out the skills and labour (and funding) to start on the interior renovations in an orderly fashion in 2023.

### Camp St. Martin (CSM)

Our summer camp, named after St. Martin of Tours, the patron saint of our archdiocese, has proven itself to be



a popular and inspiring summer program for our youth, young adults and families. It has grown and developed over the years, even with a two-year absence due to the pandemic. A present concern for camp organizers is the venue for CSM, which is Camp Artaban, situated just north of Grimshaw. Camp Artaban is owned by the Anglican Diocese of Athabasca and operated and maintained by an independent board. Our CSM organizers have some concerns about the buildings and structures, which we wish to address with the owner and operator.

Given their limited resources, we want to see where collaboration might lead us, to the benefit of all. I expect that this collaboration will involve both labour and funding, and anticipate this being in place/complete by June 1, 2023 (in time for the 2023 camp season).

#### **Cathedral Hall**

Our cathedral in McLennan is in need of a more functional hall. As the cathedral, this building is used for more than parish activities. We celebrate the Chrism Mass here every Holy Week. Often ordinations to the diaconate and priesthood are celebrated here. The kitchen and washrooms are of primary concern.



We've reached out to those with architectural and building expertise, and received their good advice. Up to now, we've been addressing structural issues that take priority. My hope is that we will have funding in place to implement the required repairs and renovations to the kitchen and washrooms in late 2023.

### Archbishop's Appeal

We have a financial problem in our diocese, which at some point we must address. We are not, and never have been, financially self-supporting as a diocese. We receive substantial grants and subsidies from other Catholic entities to keep ourselves afloat. It seems to me that we should be "mature" enough by now to function on our own. Our external funders are also considering us to be beyond mission status.

In the next 6 to 18 months, I will initiate a process to both address immediate needs such as those mentioned above, as well as becoming the mature Body of Christ to which I believe the Holy Spirit is leading us at this point in our history.

Many of you have heard me speak of this in the recent past. COVID has both made this clearer, as well as made it more urgent.

This is not simply a matter of money! More engaging than that, it is about three primary personal resources: time, talent and treasure. It isn't just about the archdiocese or the chancery office either. It's about our parishes, and creating a patrimony that will sustain us into the future.
